Fishing Events



Mother Nature has continued to present challenges to most of our anglers. Lack of bait in

Charlotte Harbor, fish with lock-jaw, rough water and frequent storms have plagued many of us, especially when targeting tarpon, our June Fish of the Month (FOM). Several anglers did solve the puzzle for redfish, snook, and cobia based on pictures of their nice catches. Others like me, by design or default, played around with shark since they were more willing to eat our offerings and bend our rods. I just hope they continue to feed aggressively in July (except during the Freedom Swim) when they become our FOM.

So maybe it wasn't a good idea for me to change our FOM lineup by moving snook to September and tarpon to June. I should have listened to John Wolfinger who had a premonition that the swap might backfire (he's a wise man). I'll take the heat which I know is coming since our list of June FOM winners would have been complete if snook were our FOM. Instead, only two people figured out how to get a tarpon to the boat and get a picture.

Congratulations go out to **Rick Sarkisian and Darlene Madsen,** who took **1st place** in the male and female angler divisions, respectively. That got them each a \$35 gift certificate and their picture on the cover of our Newsletter. Well deserved Rick and Darlene!

If you did catch a tarpon in June and didn't submit an appropriate picture, you missed out on a great prize. So make sure that if you do catch a FOM or any fish for that matter, attach a picture to an email identifying your full name, length and type of fish, date caught and a note if you used a paid guide, and send it to fishphotos@pgifishingclub.org. It's that easy, and it enters your catch into all of the Club's programs and contests as long as you satisfy each of the rules for these events. The rules can be found on the Club's great website at pgifishingclub.org.

While you're on the computer, why not also post your pictures on the Cub's Facebook page so we can all get a real time idea of what's biting or not. We now have 72 members in our Club's Facebook group and that's great.

Our July FOM contest is for shark, same as the past couple of years. You don't think I would change that after having won the last 2 years do you? That ought to get you fired up! Remember, you get one point for each shark "landed" that has a fork length under 5 feet, and 3 points for any shark "landed" that is estimated to have a fork length 5 feet or more. We don't expect you to measure big shark with a ruler or measuring stick. Do the best you can to estimate the fork length using a reference point of known length like your leader length or rod length, and make sure you quickly get a picture of the shark (you don't have to be in the picture with a shark, and consider keeping it in the water to minimize injury to you and the shark).

You or your fishing partner need to touch the leader for the shark to be considered as having been "landed", and I recommend you wear gloves when handling steel leaders, especially ones with crimps. Otherwise, you can easily get cut. It also really helps to go after big shark with a partner or two, and to fish with heavy enough gear so as not to overly stress the fish. But remember, <u>you</u> must hook and fight the fish all the way to the leader touch for it to count in this contest (i.e., no help from others except with the "landing" part). Also, fish caught with a paid guide don't count for this contest. Your shark FOM entries are due no later than August 1.

Don't forget that shark are also one of the 'prize fish' that we'll be targeting during our July 28 outing. So sign up if you haven't already for another chance to win a gift certificate from one of our local shops.

Expanding on my comment above to not injure caught fish, remember the following. If you catch protected fish, out of season fish, fish not meeting legal lengths or fish that you intend to release, please handle them as responsibly as possible so as not to damage them or exhaust them beyond their ability to recover and survive. Catching and fighting fish in the summer when water temperatures are high (90 degrees Fahrenheit in the Harbor already) is very stressful on them and quickly depletes them of oxygen.

Combine that with rough handling (i.e., netting fish with nets made of abrasive and/or thin mesh that can damage scales or fins, dropping fish, keeping them out of water too long for multiple photos, removing their protective slime, etc.), and their chance of survival is greatly reduced. As responsible anglers and stewards of our environment that want to see the health of our fisheries continue to improve, please do your best to handle all fish appropriately.

Some fish are much more susceptible to stress in warm water than others, so you don't want to play these fish too long. If you don't know which ones, stay on the side of caution and treat them all the same.

Use gear that can land all your targeted species fairly quickly. Before letting go of fish showing signs of stress, revive them in the water by holding onto their tail and pointing them into the current until you see their gills working and the fish struggling a bit to get free of your grasp (most shark and stingray excluded). Don't pull them back and forth. A little gentle side to side motion is OK. If kept in the water, shark and stingray likely won't need this sort of intervention on your part anyway (remember some shark can bite their own tail and stingray have venomous barbs on their tails).



All current contest results are nicely summarized later in this Newsletter, and awards for June will be handed out at our next general meeting on July 8. John Gettinger made it to 2000 points in June so he earned his GMA Star. Congratulations John!

Capt. Mark Miller talked about how tough fishing was in the harbor because of a lack of bait in the harbor. He suggested for snook to use shiny lures in holes, or cutbait up near the Mangroves. Use long casts and crank in slowly. Shrimp on bobbers will also work, but it will be tough. He suggested lures in the early hours then switch to the cutbait. It can be done, but it is not as easy as last year.

Our next speaker for July 8th will be Capt. Billy Barton. He has a 23

ft Ranger for his big boat and an 18 ft Action Craft for inside and smaller groups. He will launch out of the Ponce Inlet or Boca Grande, whichever is preferred. He charges \$ 350 for three for four hours and \$ 450 for six hours, and \$ 550 for 8 hours. He will give members \$ 50 off for the trip. Billy can usually be seen at Fishin' Franks. He has been fishing this area for many years and some members have used him with success.

Highlights

TEN THINGS TO KNOW 1. GAG GROUPER SEASON OPENED

Gag grouper season opened July 1 for recreational anglers in both State and Federal waters in our area. The recreational harvest minimum size limit is 22 inches total length and the daily bag limit is two gag grouper per person within the four-fish grouper aggregate limit. Season closure dates in State and Federal waters are December 4 and TBD, respectively.

2. JULY 28 FISHING OUTING REMINDER

So far, 12 boats and 23 people are signed up for the Club's next fishing outing. Although it's summer and it will likely be hot, our FED knows we can mount a better showing of interest for the chance to win a \$25 gift certificate for the longest shark, tarpon and redfish, and widest stingray. So come on, sign up at our next meeting or email Joe and help support our local businesses while honing our fishing skills.

3. NEW FWC REEF FISHING RULES APPROVED

On June 18, FWC approved measures for improving the collection of 'catch' data from Florida anglers fishing for reef fish. Effective April 1, 2015, everyone intending to harvest reef fish in Florida must obtain a FWC permit to do so even if they were not previously required to obtain a saltwater fishing license. A summary of this rule making (as well as potential shortcomings and recommended improvements) is presented on page 21.

4. COMMUNITY SERVICE PROVIDED

Carol Nieberline and Mike Gilger coordinated our Club's efforts to support the Cooper Street Kids Summer Camp's fishing event at Laishley Park Pier on June 20. Approximately half of the 21 volunteers were provided by PGIFC to assist the 35 campers ranging from kindergartners through 5th graders. Mike also rigged and subsequently cleaned up (with help from his wife Jessie) 30 rods borrowed from the local Boy Scouts. The volunteers pitched in some of their equipment as well. As always, Fishin' Frank's provided support to help bring smiles to our future anglers. See pictures of the event on page 13.

5. BASS INLET PROTOCOL CONFIRMED

Several people have been asking if it's OK to head straight out of Bass Inlet on plane (tide level permitting) instead of staying in the channel past Fishermen's Village to the Marker where "Resume Normal Operation" is posted. The Bass Inlet spot in question is the 90 degree right turn between Channel Markers 5 & 6 where a posted sign says "Slow Speed Minimum Wake to 6' Depth". According to Marine Officer John Kennedy of the PGPD, it's legal to do so since the 6' warning sign refers to traveling inside the channel only. 6. NOMINATING COMMITTEE FORMED

In accordance with our Club's By-Laws, Mike Gilger asked John Gettinger and Joe Udwari to join him on the Nominating Committee for the 2015 Officer elections and the identification of potential Board vacancies. Board members have already been requested to inform Mike if they plan to continue in their role next year. Once a list of vacancies is compiled, members will be notified and a call for nominations from the membership will be made at the September meeting. The list of candidates will subsequently be emailed to all members in advance of the November meeting, when elections will be held.

7. EDITOR ROLE FILLED (for now)

Karen Udwari stepped-up as our Club's editor in order for the Newsletter to go uninterrupted. She (undoubtedly like many others) was hesitant to fill-in for Jim Qurollo who did such a marvelous job for 2 years. With your help and support, maybe she can be convinced to stay on until someone more qualified shows interest.

8. CLUB DUES INCREASED

A \$10 per household increase in Club dues for 2015 was unanimously approved by the membership during the June 10 meeting. This was justified to keep up with inflation experienced since our last dues adjustment over 8 years ago, and to continue with our wonderful programs and prizes.

Gulf Reef Fish Reporting System Update

Several members of the PGI Fishing Club have been following the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) efforts for improving the quality of data used by them, and ultimately by the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), in assessing the recreational harvest of several reef fish species in the Gulf of Mexico. Reliable quantitative data are vital to setting appropriate limits and seasons for these fish for both commercial and recreational anglers.

Many fishermen and women recently questioned the basis for NOAA's decision to limit red snapper to a 9 day season (compared to a 40 something day season last year) for recreational anglers when the health of the red snapper stock off the coast of Southwest Florida seemed to be strong. NOAA's decision to cut the red grouper limit from 4 to 3 per person was also considered questionable by many of us given the abundance of red grouper in Federal waters off our coast. Other reef fish under NOAA's scrutiny that have had or will have their limits and/or seasons reduced or closed include: vermillion snapper; gag grouper; black grouper; gray triggerfish; and greater amberjack (including lesser amberjack; banded rudderfish and almaco jack).

It is believed by many, including FWC, that NOAA's basis for these decisions is founded on incomplete data, data biased toward commercial fishermen and/or estimates not based on fact. Therefore, at their June 18, 2014 meeting in Ft. Myers, FWC approved the implementation of a system to collect better data from recreational saltwater anglers intending to fish for reef fish.

It's a start! It's not perfect yet, but it should eventually lead to more quantitative data produced by the people who actually fish for these species in our waters, and not via a random sampling of Florida residents who may not have any inkling about these species. We encourage our Club members to embrace this effort and help supply the needed data to result in better and more fair State and Federal decision making in the future.

What can you do? First, resist the urge to complain about this being a mandatory program requiring a no cost permit (a processing fee of around \$2 may apply) if you intend to fish for these reef fish. If you're used to fishing in saltwater without a permit of any sort or bought a lifetime permit when you were still shy of 65 years young you may have the urge to gripe, but please don't. It won't do you any good at this point. For most, this requirement becomes effective April 1, 2015. There apparently will also be an early registration period if you need to buy a saltwater license between July 1, 2014 and April Fool's Day, 2015. This effort sunsets on June 30, 2020 when currently appropriated grant funding is depleted.

What was not made clear at FWC's June 18 meeting was the manner in which the hard data will eventually be collected once you declare your intent to fish for these species. Through the mandatory permitting process, FWC will first be able to more reliably identify the population of anglers fishing for these species. Perhaps they will be able to better estimate the number of fish caught by knowing the number of people fishing for them and applying scientific algorithms based on past observational data and selected interviews of anglers, but I for one am somewhat skeptical about that.

I would hope besides selected in-person, on the water interviews and targeted telephone surveys with permitted reef fish anglers, FWC will also develop a simple to use pre-paid paper mail-in form and/or an online reporting system where reef fish anglers can easily record their trip catch as well as caught-andreleased fish totals (per subject species) as soon as possible after each trip. These bright but young whipper snappers (not a reef fish species) writing these laws need to remember that our memories can no longer hold too much information, and we sometimes find it hard to remember what we caught the day after our trip unless we took pictures. Few of us write a fishing log, and if it becomes too cumbersome, timeconsuming or difficult for most to accurately record the information, the quality of collected data will suffer.

Perhaps it will be better than it was, but not as good and reliable as it could be with just a little more FWC effort. I hope this is on FWC's agenda and the necessary funding to implement and maintain an automated record keeping system is made available. Other states do it, so why can't we? We're the 4th most populous state with about 19.5 million residents and whose economy is largely impacted by recreational fishing? That's enough justification, I think.
