FISHING EVENTS John Wolfinger



The month of June had some really good fishing days and also had many days that were a complete washout. Tropical storm Debby sure dumped a lot of rain on us during the month. I read that the official amount rain in Punta Gorda was close to 8

inches. All that rain combined with the strong south winds gave us the highest tides many people in PGI had ever seen. Most all docks were underwater and the low tides were higher than our normal highest high tides. This was one time where you didn't need a flats boat; you could have gone just about anywhere you wanted with a deep V hull. The problem was you would have had to deal with 30 mph winds and 3-4' waves in the harbor. For that reason, there wasn't much fishing going in the harbor during the storm. I think everyone was suffering from cabin fever and they had "tropical depression" because they didn't see the sun for almost a week.

The water in the Harbor now looks like strong coffee from all the rain because there is a lot of fresh water out there; and more coming down from the rivers every day as they drain. I'm not sure how this will affect fishing but when you fish, you may need to think a little differently than prior to the storm. Fish that may have been holding in certain areas before the storm may have moved after the storm. Time will tell.

Despite the bad weather, our Fish of the Month contest for SNOOK finished up June 30th with four winners for the top three places and we had a total of 8 submissions. Congratulations go out to:

Thanks go out to all of the members that submitted pictures of their SNOOK catches. If you caught a big one and didn't submit it, you may have missed out on a great gift certificate. **It's easy to submit entries; just** e-mail a picture of you with the fish along with your name, date caught, length and type of fish to PGIFishingClub@pgica.org or drop off a picture with the same information at the PGICA office. (This also applies to Master Angler, Ladder of Achievement and Isles Trophy Race entries.)

The July Fish of the Month will be SHARK. We're giving awards in July based on the number of sharks caught. But there will be a little twist. Since catching a big shark is an achievement, any shark 5 feet or longer to the fork will count as "3". Pictures are still needed but you can take the picture of the shark in the water. For example, if you catch three, 3' sharks and one, 5' shark during the month of July; your total will equal 6. It's that simple.

One additional reminder; if you are working on your Ladder of Achievement, a 5 foot shark is also worth 300 points; a 50 inch shark is worth 200 points and a 40 inch shark is worth 100 points. So if you need points for your Ladder of Achievement, be sure to send in the estimated length to the fork with the photo. All species of sharks get credit, so you don't need to be concerned with identifying the species. Bob Rand will make sure you get credit for both the monthly contest and the Ladder if he gets the correct information.

FWC finally made their decision about the snook season for 2012. They decided to keep the season closed for one more year. So you can still fish for snook but you can't keep any until September 2013. Catch and release only! In my opinion, this is a good thing for the snook population that is coming back strong. If we have a mild winter in 2013, the snook fishing should be incredible next year.

Gag grouper opened July 1 so for those of you that like to fish for them you have the next 4 months to do it. These are a very popular fish and are excellent table fare. The downside is, most Gag grouper are further offshore right now and usually don't move into the harbor in big numbers until later in the year when the season will be closing. The FWC size limit in the Gulf is 22 inches and you can keep two.

Now take advantage of living in one of the best fishing areas in the country and GO FISH!

Grilled Redfish



This recipe comes from a New Orleans friend. When he discovered we were moving to SW Florida, he said here's a great redfish recipe that is easy and delicious. We have

used this recipe numerous times this past year, and he was not kidding!



Ingredients:

- One or more redfish...18"-27"
- Extra Virgin Olive oil
- Lemons <u>or</u> oranges <u>or</u> limes.—about one per redfish—I like the lemons best.
- Seasoning of your choice—Weber's Lemon Pepper is fairly mild but is our favorite

Preparation:

Fillet the redfish and remove any bones you find in the fillets. You can leave the skin on or remove it if you want. I've done it both ways and the skinned fillet is easiest (no scaling required) and just as good.

Warm up your gas grill or start the charcoal.

Place fillets on a plate and rub both sides with olive oil, then with skin side down sprinkle seasoning on top.

Slice lemons or oranges or limes into about 1/8" slices and cover each fillet with a layer of slices.

Cooking:

Put the fillets on grill, citrus slices on top. With a gas grill, you need to be able to turn off a burner so the fillets can cook with indirect heat, not directly above a lighted burner. Turn remaining burner(s) to low setting. If you use charcoal, you need to separate the briquettes to the sides so fillets will not be over direct heat.

Close the top of grill and cook for 17—20 minutes depending on fillet thickness (I lean toward 17). You could probably fix this same recipe in your oven for same times at around 250 degrees, but I haven't tried it.

Remove citrus slices and enjoy a delicious SW Florida fish! Goes great with rice and salad...and it's even good for you. By the way, this same cooking method works very nicely with other fish fillets like Spanish mackerel.

Cut Bait Fishing by Jim Qurollo

you are after redfish, one of the best methods I've found is to fish cut bait under the mangroves on either side of Charlotte Harbor, around Turtle or Bull Bays and Pine Island Sound. Ladyfish has been an excellent choice for me, but some local fishermen swear by cut mullet, crab chunks or pieces of larger threadfins. Use what you have, but remember that reds like the shade when the tide is in and they can reach it.

Try cutting an average size ladyfish, mullet, etc. into 1" to 1.5" steaks. Use a circle hook of around 5/0 size and hook the cut bait steak from flesh side out through the skin. Be sure and leave plenty of hook point exposed. Normally you would not use any weight because the cut bait steak should be plenty heavy enough to cast easily.

Anchor a comfortable casting distance from overhanging mangroves during incoming high, through high tide or the first part of outgoing tide. Toss the cut bait as far under the mangroves as you can. If your fishing spot has quite a bit of current, you may want some weight added up your leader to keep the bait from washing out from under the shade of the mangroves. Put your pole into a holder, sit back and relax.

When your rod doubles over and the drag starts complaining, grab it, point it about 90 degrees away from the direction the redfish is running—most likely he'll be trying to get further into the mangroves hold the rod tip low to the water—to try and keep the line out of the down hanging mangroves—while you pull and reel like hell. If you're lucky, you get the red out into open water before he breaks you off. I did not mention "set the hook" because with circle hooks, you just want to put a good bend in your rod and start reeling, no hook set necessary or desired.

This sounds like a lazy



way to fish, especially if you prefer tossing lures, but some days it is the most productive.

The Loop Knot by Jim Qurollo

O ne of the very best and easiest to tie terminal tackle knots for most Charlotte Harbor fishing is a loop knot. A no slip loop knot has some advantages over knots like the clinch, improved clinch, Palomar, uni-knot, etc.

Although a loop knot may not be an exceptionally high line strength knot, when using fluorocarbon leader that is routinely heavier than your main line, a loop knot tied to a live bait hook or to most lures gives the bait or lure much better action than a "clinched down tight" knot. A loop knot is almost a necessity for most top water lures like the Zara Spook and similar.

For me, an unforeseen advantage is the fact that, when desired, you can often break the loop knot before you break the line to leader knot (e.g. double uni-knot or Sebile knot) used to tie the fluorocarbon leader to the main line. This can save time when you hang your circle hooked white bait in the mangroves and need to break it loose to continue fishing.

One of the best loop knots is the MirrOlure knot. I've used it for years...easy to tie and reliable. Here's a graphic from *Polk Outdoors.com* that gives a pretty good illustration of how to tie a MirrOlure knot.
