Bait – Whitebait, shrimp, fiddler crabs, squid, lures, jigs

Habitat – Juvenile gray snapper are found inshore in tidal creeks, mangroves, and grass beds. Adults are generally found near shore or offshore on coral or rocky reefs.

Tip – Fluorocarbon leader a must

Bait - Shrimp, white bait, paddle tails, jigs

Habitat – shallow sandy flats, near rocks and rubble, soft bottoms near bars, holes in grass beds, and edges of channels



Pompano




Bait – Sand fleas, silly jig tipped with shrimp

Habitat – Ocean surf along beeches and in bays mostly in or near channels that run through flats.

Look for skippers while boat is drifting or motoring.

Fish the edges of flats, points of sandbars off Cape Haze and outside the bar on the east and west walls and from Burnt Store to 2 Pines. Some occasionally show up in the PGI rim canal. Also fish the passes.









Bait – Crabs and Shrimp



Often confused with Pompano and Jack Crevalle

Bait – Spoons, jigs, and lures can be used, but best is live bait such as, sand perch, blue runners, cigar minnow, pin fish, or grunts.

Habitat – offshore reefs from 60 ft. to several hundred feet deep.

Behavior - Great amberjacks are the largest of the jacks. These fish are thought to spawn offshore throughout most of the year. Greater amberjack feed on squid, fish, and crustaceans.



Bull Shark

Habitat - Common apex predator that inhabits estuarine, nearshore and offshore waters. One of the few shark species that may inhabit freshwater, sometimes venturing hundreds of miles inland via coastal river systems.



Feeding - An opportunistic feeder of bony fishes and invertebrate species, sharks, rays, dolphins, sea turtles, and sea birds.

Reproduction - Gives birth to live young in shallow bays and coastal lagoons. Litters contain 1-13 pups. Size at birth about 2.4 feet.

Size/Age - Maximum size about 11 feet. Matures at approximately 14-18 years of age (about 6.5 feet) and is estimated to live 24+ years.



Great Hammerhead Shark

(c) Himmas Mortine

Habitat - A common tropical and subtropical shark that inhabits the open ocean and the shallow coastal waters. Favors continental and insular coral reefs but is often associated with inlets and the mouths of bays. Nomadic and migratory.

Feeding - Feeds on a stingrays, grouper, sea catfish, a variety of bony fishes, sharks, crabs, and squid.

Reproduction - Gives birth to live young. Litters contain 13-40 pups. Size at birth about 2 feet. Utilizes shallow bays and coastal waters as nursery areas.

Size/Age - Maximum size about 18 feet. Matures at approximately 7-8 feet and is a long-lived shark (20+ years).

Live Bait vs Artificial?

I use almost exclusively artificial soft plastics (DOA Shrimp, 3" Paddle Tails)

- I believe there are two reasons to use live shrimp:
- 1)You're BRAND new to fishing here
- 2)You aren't able to efficiently and quietly cover ground
- Popping Cork Rig:
- 1)Adds sound dynamic
- 2)Keeps bait exactly within grass tips
- 3)Easy to locate (prevents cross-casting)



LOCATION

- Look for 2.8-3.5 foot of water over healthy grass beds.
- Find flats that are NEAR deeper water
- Turtle Grass is best grass species to work
- Try to fish areas with breeze above 5 mph
- Drift and anchor several times per spot. 20 yards makes a big difference



- Don't fish grass that is matted up with dead brown grass (red tide?)
- QUIET!
- Fish edges of potholes
- "Fish the Slick"




Slicks naturally form with breeze conditions.


Trout hate direct sunlight.

Slick forms a "boundary" to them




Monster Summer Snook






- extremely cold sensitive
- stomachs contain only about a quarter of what is in them in the summer.
- cold water=slow metabolic rate
- decreased feeding
- Not a good time to fish snook ⊗





Snook Regulations

Currently catch and release only



Prior open seasons

- Season: Closed Dec. 15-Jan. 31
 and June 1-Aug. 31
- Slot Limit: Not less than 28" or more than 32" total length
- Daily Bag Limit: 1 per harvester per day; zero captain and crew for-hire limit

13" < Mature Males < 28"

20" < Mature Females <45"

How to Catch

Tackle and Bait

Adult snook diet

- Fish 70%
 - pinfish 20%
 - ten times more pinfish in the summer months
 - minnows 16%
 - Other 64%
 - Think White Bait ©
- **Shrimp** 13%
 - feed on shrimp year-round but more so in the winter
- prefer prey >14% their own body length
 - Larger bait=larger snook ©
 - 43"Snook
 - > 6" bait
 - Ladyfish
 - mullet





Black Drum – General

- State record 96lbs
- World record 146lbs
- Club Record 51.5", Mike White
- Bottom feeders keep bait on the bottom
- Bait crabs, shrimp, soft plastics
- Habitat oyster beds, docks/canals, bridge pilings, and bait pods in open water





Black Drum – Best Bet

- Late July/early August until fist cold front in October
- Hundreds of large drum school up in the canals near large areas of open water and into the canals that intersect
- Size range from 34" 42+"
- Most successful in the morning tide not much of an impact










Black Drum – Best Bet - How to Find Them

Set side scan to 80'








Black Drum – Best Bet

- Gear 6-14 or 8-17 with 3000 spinning reel
- Rigging 20lb braid with 20lb leader. 1/16 or 1/8 oz strong jig head with a medium size hook and Gulp Swimming mullet. Many Gulp and soft plastics work (Terror Eyz)
- Technic cast into school, let lure sink, **VERY** slow retrieve. You should feel the lure on top of the fish.
- Be prepared to relocate the school after a fish is hooked they move a lot
- Be prepared and know how to revive the fish for safe release



Black Drum – Harbor

Baitfish with Jacks, Drum, and Tarpon



- Random schools of Drum can be found in the harbor – look for baitfish busting up
- If Jacks are mixed in, let the lure sink down slowly and keep the action slower – the drum aren't as aggressive as Jacks
- Can also be found with Tarpon hanging around baitfish



Sheepshead – General

- State record 15lbs 2oz
- World record 21lbs 4oz
- Club Record 26", Mike White
- Bottom feeders keep bait on the bottom
- Bait small crabs, small shrimp, oysters, and barnacles
- Habitat oyster bars, docks, bridge pilings, reefs (near shore and harbor)





Sheepshead – Best Bet locations

- When October April/May
- Where structure with barnacles docks, seawalls, Alligator Reef, near shore reefs, makers, any given depth
- Rod 6-14 or 8-17 with 2,500 3000 spinning reel
- Rigging 10 20lb braid with 10 20lb leader, jig head or hook with split – smaller hook
- Technic cast/drop over/at structure, let lure sink, wait for the "nibble" then the commitment to take the bait. If nibbles don't turn into a bite, very slowly reel the bait away



Spanish Mackerel

Fred Benson





- Back is bluish-green, fading to silvery sides and belly
- Irregular golden-yellow spots on sides
- Bluish-black blotch on front of first dorsal fin
- Lateral line slopes gently from behind the gill cover to the tail

Size: Up to 36 inches, State Record 12 lb. Club Record – 30" Carl Leicher


Feeds on small fishes and invertebrates.

Spanish Mackerel are aggressive feeders that will strike a wide variety of natural and artificial baits. Many anglers identify the location of Spanish mackerel by trolling or watching for birds diving on schools of baitfish, which often indicates that mackerel are forcing the bait to the surface.



Bait – Troll spoons, lures, jigs or free line cigar minnows, blue runners or pilchards

Habitat – Found offshore from 25 ft. to continental shelf. Good place to troll is around offshore reefs such as the box cars.

Behavior – Must use wire as teeth are like razors. If using live bait use a stinger rig.





- Bait Buster under a cork
- Bait Buster slow trolled on bottom
- Bait Buster sight casting

- > Reel Penn Fathom 40
- ➤ Rod Penn Rampage 6.2
 - > Rated 50 to 100# braid
- > #8 non offset circle hooks









Tackle

- > Sabiki rod
- ➤ Sabiki rig #8
- > 20# main
- > 16# branch





- > Snell knot on hook
- → 4 5' 80# fluorocarbon leader
- ➤ 65# braid with 1.5" snap swivel
- Carolina, fishfinder (Jersey)
- > 10# weight
- Swivel to braid palamar knot





Starting Out

- ➤ Weather Know your boat
 - Windfinder, Windy, Buoyweather
- ➤ Where to go wind, seas
- > Structure
 - > ledges, holes, humps, hard bottom





Getting Bait

- > Hit or miss
- > Grunts, sand perch (squirrel fish), Pinfish
- Cigar minnows, sardines
- Back up squid
- > Fish bites or squid for sabiki









Setting Up

- > Drifting .5 to 1 knot
- Over structure read the sonar
- Dead stick
- > Hold the rod





Rigging The Live Bait

- > In front of dorsal
- > Through bottom lip to upper lip
- Behind anal gland





Techniques

- > Hold bottom
- Be patient
- Present bait naturally
- Grouper are intelligent hunters
- > Smaller grouper (dinks) will peck
- Larger grouper will circle bait





Techniques

- ➤ Be prepared when big grouper hit, they hit
- ➤ Not trout fishing put the hammer down
- > First five cranks are critical
- > This is where the battle is won / loss
- > Don't let it get you in a hole
- ➤ Pull up Reel down
- Constant pressure

- > Fish rules app
- > Reds 20" min 2 PP
- > Points 25" 29" 33"
- > Gag, scamp, black, goliath
- Vent released fish

- > Sharks, Amberjack, snapper
- > Barracuda, porgy, pufferfish

UPON JOINING YOU BECOME AN ANGLER, THEN YOU MOVE UP FROM THERE WE'LL DISCUSS ELIGIBLE SPECIES LIST LATER – ALL LEVELS BELOW REQUIRE FISH FROM THE ELIGIBLE SPECIES LIST, THESE ARE STANDARD REQUIREMENTS

- 1. FIRST FISH OF ANY SIZE OR LENGTH FROM THE ELIGIBLE SPECIES LIST = CLUB HAT
- 2. NEXT IS BRONZE PIN 5 FISH OF ANY SIZE
- 3. THEN SILVER PIN 5 FISH OF ELIGIBLE SIZE & 300 POINTS (MORE ON POINTS LATER)
- 4. GOLD PIN IS NEXT 7 FISH OF ELIGIBLE SIZE & 700 POINTS
- 5. SNOOK PIN LIFETIME MASTER ANGLER LEVEL I 9 FISH OF ELIGIBLE SIZE & 1000 POINTS
- 6. REDFISH PIN LIFETIME MASTER ANGLER LEVEL II 13 FISH OF SIZE & 1400 POINTS
